## RENEWAL COALITION

(Formerly "A Wounded Warrior's Second Chance")

Guided by a deep sense of gratitude, Renewal Coalition was incorporated in February 2010 with a Mission Statement that reads simply - "to assist wounded service members and their families in their transition from military to civilian life by offering a vacation experience at Florida residences with the intent of providing these families a relaxed, pleasant, and welcoming environment." Since then, they have hosted 101 military personnel, 57 spouses, 68 children, 4 widows, 3 moms and 1 caretaker, a total of 234 persons.

Through the vision of its founders Sandy and Sara Lankler, the group considers it a privilege to offer assistance to those who have given so much in the name of duty. There's currently a minimum of 6 wounded warriors vacations annually and starting in 2012 they've added 3 special retreats for non-wounded service members; Marine Pre-Deployment, Gold Star Family (families with loved ones killed in action) and the Navy SEALs.

The Village of Tequesta lends its ardent support to this cause. Our Wounded Warriors often return from war with injuries that require months or even years at military hospitals and rehabilitation centers. The healing process, which takes an enormous amount of time, can be tedious, emotionally demanding, and financially overwhelming. Reestablishing family connections is difficult under such conditions and that's where this organization steps in - offering precious time to reconnect and renew family bonds in a relaxing environment for a week.

All the condos used are currently located in Tequesta and as each family arrives, they receive a welcome basket full of items to make their stay comfortable. All meals are provided and hosted by local residents, businesses and organizations. During the week, family members may choose from a list of activities in which they can participate. These include deep sea fishing, spa treatments, water slide excursions, jet skiing, kayaking, sporting events, golf outings, pool, and trips to local attractions. Or they may wish to just spend private time together, a day at the beach, an evening at the movies, or simply enjoy a good old fashioned game of monopoly.

Lodging, meals, entertainment, ground travel and even the small amenities are the complete responsibility of Renewal Coalition. Depending on the number of children per family, the average cost of a retreat experience for 5 Wounded Warriors and their families is approximately \$15,000. 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## Anyone Can Make a Difference at Any Age



Over the past 4 years, 89-year-old Marilyn Marshall has dedicated as many as 6 days a week volunteering at Our Sister's Place. That's why she is the first-ever recipient of the Tequesta Terrace Senior Service Award. While Marilyn does not live at Tequesta Terrace, she is an inspiration to the staff, residents and wider community. As part of the award, Tequesta Terrace presented her and Our Sister's Place with \$500 each during a tropical party held on Tuesday, July 31st.

Hazel Raigue, Executive Director and founder of Our Sister's Place, nominated Marshall for the honor. "She is like the grandmother you never had," said Raigue. "She comes in, pats you on the back, talks to you and helps in any way she can. She has made our organization a better place."

Our Sister's Place supports victims of domestic violence and donates much needed items and proceeds from its Thrift Store to The Florida Resource Center for Women & Children, Inc. Marshall does just about everything when she volunteers. She cleans items, sorts them, works in the back room, and she even crochets dish towels for the victims.

"It gets me out of the house and keeps me active. It is satisfying work... I like it," said Marshall. "I like giving back and helping people. I've done that all of my life. At 89, I take one day at a time. I intend to do this as long as I can."

Tequesta Terrace Assisted Living started the award program to acknowledge active seniors who are making a difference and the community selected Our Sister's Place as the first charity to receive this honor.

"It is important to recognize active adults who dedicate their lives to helping our community," said Lisa Gallagher, executive director, Tequesta Terrace Assisted Living. "We want everyone to know, no matter your age, you can have a positive impact on the world around you."

## Tequesta Residents - Safer On Land... And On The Water

When an offshore medical emergency happens, your chances for survival on the water are greatly enhanced if Tequesta's Marine-85 Rescue is involved.

Prior to 2006, there was no on-water medical response available on South Florida's east coast, north of Miami. The Coast Guard stopped staffing their boats with EMT's years ago and none of the Police agencies provided medical care. Persons who were injured on the ocean were expected to get themselves back to a marina in the Jupiter Inlet where they would be met by Fire-Rescue at the dock. The Village of Tequesta's Fire Chief James Weinand recognized the risk and lack of response-capability to our many residents who boat in the Jupiter/Tequesta area and committed to fill that void by developing a marine-rescue counterpart to his land-based Fire-Rescue ambulances, thus enabling the Village to provide our residents with the highest level of care possible, whether on land or offshore.



Accordingly, the Village purchased a 22' rigid-hull inflatable rescue boat and designated it as Marine-85, used by both the Fire-Rescue Department for Emergency Medical Response and by the Police Department for routine patrol. In addition, the boat would also act as a platform for Village Fire Department Dive-Rescue operations.

It was determined that the Village's rescue boat would be equipped and staffed at the same high standard as our Advanced Life Support (ALS) ambulances. As a result, Marine-85 is the only ALS Marine unit in Palm Beach County; in fact the only ALS Emergency Medical Response boat of its kind north of Miami. ALS means we are providing Paramedics, medications, IV supplies, EKG monitoring with defibrillators and advanced airway equipment. This enhanced offshore level of care is then taken out to the patient instead of expecting the patient to make their way to land for awaiting care.

This offshore emergency response is the same concept behind the land-based ambulance service; mobilize and take the medical care that the Emergency Room would provide in the first 20-minutes and bring it to the patient. That essential timesaving strategy has been proven to save lives. Tequesta's Marine-85 has extended that same concept out onto the ocean, and since no other agency in this or adjoining counties provides ALS emergency marine-care to its community, the Village is available to serve residents beyond its municipal boundaries. In fact, when the Village of Tequesta initially began providing this service, the State of Florida's Department of Emergency Medical Services requested Chief Weinand meet with them in Miami to explain what Tequesta was doing because there were no other agencies in the State providing this service. Tequesta was setting the standard then and is continuing to provide and improve its high level of care to its residents every day.

Now, Tequesta's Marine-85 Rescue works closely with the US Coast Guard, Palm Beach County Fire-Rescue, Palm Beach County Lifeguards, local Police agencies and the local Charter Dive Boats. The rescue boat is kept on a lift and is manned by on-duty Firefighter/Paramedics when needed. It stands at-the-ready 24-hours-a-day, 365-days-a-year. It has been called out in the middle of the day and in the middle of the night. Tequesta is ready to rescue sick or injured boaters in our area and provide a heightened level of care that is truly second to none! Village of Tequesta residents should feel quite a bit safer, both on land as well as offshore.

### Tequesta Police Needs Your Help!

Increased signs of potential burglaries have prompted Police to recruit the help of all Tequesta residents in reporting suspicious activity in your neighborhood. Thieves are canvassing homes, pretending to be salespeople, and gaining information about you and your neighbors with intentions of finding and preying upon unsuspecting residents. Tequesta has a "No Soliciting" law that prohibits door-to-door canvassing and all residents are asked to alert our police to investigate on-the-spot violations to safeguard our neighborhoods. Police will welcome your report of any suspicious or strange activity that simply doesn't seem right. Our Police Chief encourages your call and assures that all calls will be appreciated and handled discreetly.

### Drainage System Improvements Seabrook Road to Short Avenue



Construction of the main drainage system started in July and is expected to be completed by October 25, 2012, weather permitting. This timely project consists of replacing the 48 inch concrete pipe from Seabrook Road to Short Avenue and the resurfacing of Tequesta Drive in the same work zone.

#### How will this affect you?

- A detour is in place with ongoing road closures throughout the life of the project.
- Residents who live on the south side of Tequesta Drive will always have access to their properties.
- Businesses on the north side of Tequesta Drive will have access from N. Dover Road.
- Heavy equipment is in use with back up alarms and pumps running 24 hours a day during certain phases of the project to keep the construction area dry.
